

INDICATORS THAT A PERSON MAY BE AT RISK OF SEXUAL EXPLOITATION AND HUMAN TRAFFICKING





Are fearful, anxious, depressed, submissive, nervous, or paranoid



Appears malnourished, sleep-deprived, or in need of medical care



Shows signs of ownership, such as tattoos, brands, and jewelry, used by traffickers to mark their property



Has multiple cell phones



Has hotel room keys



knowledge
of a given
community
or whereabouts



Displays a dramatic personality change, evasive behaviour, and disengagement from school, hobbies, family, and friends



Has expensive items, such as hair styles, manicures, cell phones, clothes, and excess cash, with no known source of income



Inconsistencies in information and lack of ID



Protects the person who is hurting them and is not allowed or able to speak for themselves



Is a chronic truant, runaway, or homeless youth

INDICATORS TO WATCH FOR IN THE COMMERCIAL TRUCKING SECTOR



Is involved in the solicitation of commercial sex

- In the past, customers were commonly solicited through radio messaging, knocking on truck doors, and directly approaching truckers at truck stops and rest areas.
- Radio messaging codes heard such as: "commercial company", "looking for company", "sleeper leaper", "hustle", and "bunk bunny".
- Today, drivers will talk about "where they can get action" and book "company" online using tools such as Craigslist, Kijiji, LeoList, Twitter, Facebook, and WhatsApp.
- "Hook ups" are made at truck stops, hotels, and restaurants. Vehicles are seen dropping off and picking up solicited individuals, including youth.
